DADABHAI NAOROJI

Dadabhai Naoroji was born on 4th September 1825 (also known as the "Grand Old Man of India" and "Unofficial Ambassador of India"), was an Indian political leader, merchant, scholar and writer who served as 2nd, 9th, and 22nd President of the Indian National Congress from 1886 to 1887, 1893 to 1894 and 1906 to 1907. He was a Liberal Party Member of Parliament in the British House of Commons, representing Finsbury Central between 1892 and 1895. He was the second person of Asian descent to be a British MP.

His book *Poverty and Un-British Rule in India* brought attention to the Indian wealth drain into Britain. In it he explained his wealth drain theory. He was also a member of the SECOND INTERNATIONAL along with Kautsky and Plekhanov. Dadabhai Naoroji's works in the congress are praiseworthy. In 1886, 1893, and 1906, i.e., thrice was he elected as the president of INC. In 2014, Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg inaugurated the Dadabhai Naoroji Awards for services to UK-India relations. India Post depicted Naoroji on stamps in 1963, 1997 and 2017.



Dadabhai Naoroji is regarded as one of the most important Indians during the birth of the nascent independence movement. In his writings, he came to the conclusion that the exertion of foreign rule over India was not favourable for the nation, and that independence (or at the very least, responsible government) would be the better path for India.

Further development was checked by the frequent invasions of India by, and the subsequent continuous rule of, foreigners of entirely different character and genius, who, not having any sympathy with the indigenous literature – on the contrary, having much fanatical antipathy to the religion of the Hindus – prevented its further growth. Priest-hood, first for power and afterwards from ignorance, completed the mischief, as has happened in all other countries.

Naoroji is often remembered as the "Grand Old Man of Indian Nationalism."

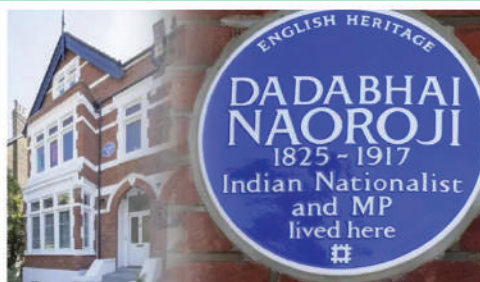
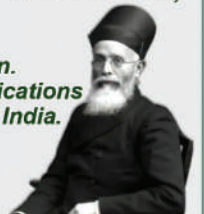
Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi wrote to Naoroji in 1894, saying that "The Indians look up to you as children to the father. Such is really the feeling here."

Bal Gangadhar Tilak admired him; he said: If we twenty eight crore of Indians were entitled to send only one member to the British parliament, there is no doubt that we would have elected Dadabhai Naoroji unanimously to grace that post.

Here are the significant extracts taken from his speech delivered before the East India Association on 2 May 1867 regarding what educated Indians expect from their British rulers. The difficulties thrown in the way of according to the natives such reasonable share and voice in the administration of the country as they are able to take, are creating some uneasiness and distrust. The universities are sending out hundreds and will soon begin to send out thousands of educated natives. This body naturally increases in influence... "In this Memorandum I desire to submit for the kind and generous consideration of His Lordship the Secretary of State for India, that from the same cause of the deplorable drain [of economic wealth from India to Britain], besides the material exhaustion of India, the moral loss to her is no less sad and lamentable . . . All [the Europeans] effectually do is to eat the substance of India, material and moral, while living there, and when they go, they carry away all they have acquired . . . The thousands of Indians that are being sent out by the universities every year find themselves in a most anomalous position. There is no place for them in their motherland . . . What must be the inevitable consequence? . . . despotism and destruction . . . or destroying hand and power. "

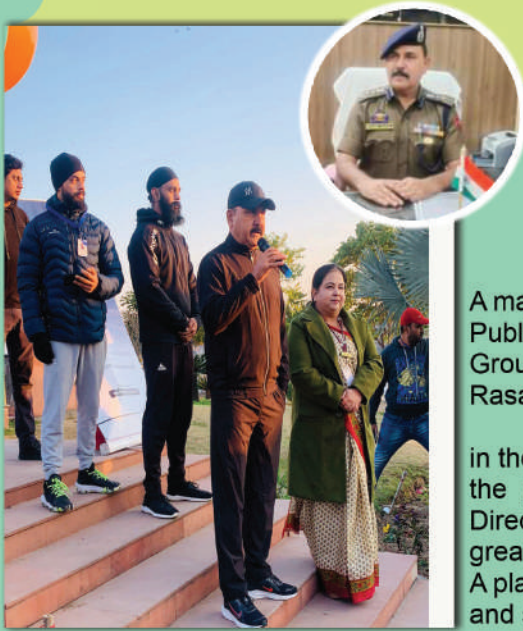
MARATHON

Claim to fame

When Riya Karumanchi was 14-years-old, she noticed her friend's visually-impaired grandmother bump into tables and objects around the house while using her cane. Karumanchi always assumed that this cane had some technology embedded into it and was shocked to realize that the white cane wasn't updated since its initial design in 1921. So Karumanchi set out to design a smarter cane, one that would help blind people navigate better with advanced technological capability. The result was the smartCANE, a white cane embedded with sensors, a GPS, vibration, and audio feedback. The cane's proprietary computer vision technology uses built-in cameras to detect objects in real-time while the user is navigating their environment.

The cane is capable of narrating the objects nearby, detecting areas that are well lit or have wet surfaces, providing turn-by-turn directions with vibrational feedback, location sharing with family and friends, and a button for medical emergencies. Karumanchi received \$56,000 in initial funding from various investors, including Microsoft, after developing her company at Ryerson University's DMZ Sandbox business incubator. Karumanchi serves as the CEO and founder of smartCANE that has gone on to help 285 million visually impaired people and has won 16 awards. Karumanchi was named as one of Teen Vogue's 21 Under 21 and is currently interning at Deloitte Digital while finishing up high school in Toronto, Canada.

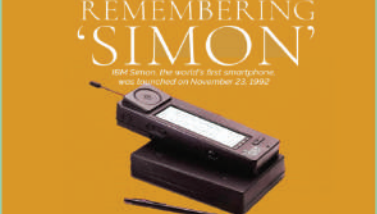

The first Smartphone was called the *Simon Personal Communicator*, and it was created by IBM more than 15 years before Apple released the iPhone. CURRENT AFFAIRS

1. **Tamil Nadu Achieves record With Highest Number of Ramsar Sites in India.** Tamil Nadu has set a new benchmark in environmental conservation and biodiversity protection by securing two more Ramsar sites, thus achieving the highest number of such designated areas in the country. The recent addition of the Longwood Shola Reserve Forest in The Nilgiris and the Karaivetti Bird Sanctuary in Ariyalur has propelled the state to the forefront of ecological conservation efforts in India. With these new designations, Tamil Nadu now boasts 16 Ramsar sites, a testament to its rich biodiversity and the state government's commitment to preserving it.



2. **Three Indian Scientists to Be Honored With Prestigious UK Prize In London.** The prestigious Blavatnik Awards will recognize the exceptional contributions of Rahul R Nair, Mehul Malik, Tanmay Bharat, and other early career scientists at a black-tie gala in London on February 27. These awards, totaling 480,000 pounds in grants, underscore the importance of recognition and research funding in propelling scientific breakthroughs. Rahul R Nair has been honoured as the Laureate in Physical Sciences & Engineering for his pioneering work in developing innovative membranes using two-dimensional (2D) materials. Professor Mehul Malik's work harnesses high-dimensional entanglement to create robust quantum networks, promising secure transmission of data over long distances. Dr. Tanmay Bharat, a structural microbiologist at the MRC Laboratory of Molecular Biology, utilizes cryo-electron tomography to uncover atomic-level details of cell surface molecules. testament to its rich biodiversity and the state government's commitment to preserving it.



3. **India Launches UPI Payments At Eiffel Tower In Paris.** India has officially introduced the Unified Payments Interface (UPI) at the iconic Eiffel Tower in Paris, marking a significant step towards realizing Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of globalizing UPI. NPCI International Payments (NIPL) has partnered with French e-commerce and proximity payments company, Lyra, to facilitate the acceptance of UPI payments in France. The collaboration between India and France in the digital payments sector, initiated in July, allows the use of India's UPI for retail payments in France. This groundbreaking agreement positions France as the pioneer in embracing UPI on the European continent.



4. **Bapu Tower: A Monumental Tribute to Mahatma Gandhi In Patna, Bihar.** In the heart of Patna, Bihar, a new landmark has emerged as a monumental tribute to Mahatma Gandhi, fondly known as the Father of the Nation. The Bapu Tower, located in Gardanibagh, stands as a testament to the enduring legacy and ideals of Mahatma Gandhi. The Bapu Tower, towering at a height of 120 feet and comprising six stories, is the realization of a dream project envisioned by Chief Minister Nitish Kumar. The tower is not just an architectural marvel but also a hub for learning and reflection on Gandhi's life and contributions to India's freedom struggle and his universal principles of peace, non-violence, and harmony.



5. **Gupteswar Forest, Odisha's New Biodiversity Heritage Site.** Odisha has taken a significant step towards conservation by declaring the Gupteswar forest in Koraput district as its fourth Biodiversity Heritage Site (BHS). This declaration marks a pivotal moment in the state's environmental conservation efforts, joining the ranks of Mandasaru, Mahendragiri, and Gandhamardan, which have previously been recognized for their unique biodiversity. The Gupteswar forest spans over 350 hectares. This area is not just a haven for a wide array of flora and fauna but also holds a sacred significance, with its groves traditionally worshipped by the local community.



6. **IIT Jammu Develops Sound-Based Anti-Drone System.** Professor Karan Nathwani from IIT-Jammu has created a groundbreaking anti-drone system that relies on sound technology. Priced at approximately Rs 4 lakh, the system offers a cost-effective alternative to conventional anti-drone technologies. Capable of detecting drones, aircraft, and birds within a 300-meter range, the system offers versatility and effectiveness across various scenarios. With production costs ranging from Rs 25,000 to Rs 40,000, it remains accessible to a wide range of users.



7. **India Opens Space Sector To 100% Foreign Investment.** India has taken a significant step by opening its space sector to 100% foreign direct investment (FDI) through an amendment in the FDI policy. Under the amended FDI policy, various sub-sectors and activities within the space sector now have liberalized FDI thresholds. The liberalized entry routes are expected to enhance the ease of doing business in India, leading to increased FDI inflows and contributing to overall economic growth, investment, income, and employment opportunities.



8. **The Forest Department in Uttar Pradesh's Gonda district, in collaboration with the Turtle Survival Alliance Foundation India, is initiating a conservation effort.** This endeavor aims to establish a turtle conservation reserve along the Sarju river, a tributary of the Ghaghra river. Gonda district is known for its turtle diversity, making it an ideal location for such a conservation effort. The proposed reserve will encompass a 2-kilometer stretch of the Sarju river, teeming with a diverse array of plant species, avifauna, fishes, and water snakes.



9. **India is set to launch its first Helicopter Emergency Medical Service (HEMS) from Uttarakhand, marking a significant milestone in the country's healthcare and aviation sectors.** The HEMS will be based at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) in Rishikesh, strategically located to cover a radius of 150 kilometers. This positioning enables the swift airlifting of individuals who have encountered accidents or medical emergencies, ensuring prompt access to critical healthcare facilities.

Indeed, as they went up the hill, the old cracked pot took notice of the sun warming the beautiful wild flowers on the side of the path, and this cheered it some. But at the end of the trail, it still felt bad because it had leaked out half its load, and so again it apologized to the bearer for its failure.

The bearer said to the pot, "Did you notice that there were flowers only on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because have always known about your flaw, and I took advantage of it. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walk back from the stream, you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate my master's table. Without you being just the way you are, he would not have this beauty to grace his house."
